







Club announces challenge topics for 2025-26

The Board of Directors has announced the challenge topics for next year.

September

A Quiet Moment. Look for a scene where a person or animal is enjoying a quiet moment. Not looking for an empty street or a picture in a forest with no one there.

October

Shoot from Above. An image can either be achieved by shooting straight down at your subject(s) or shooting from a high vantage point.

November

Blue Hour. Shoot during the period shortly after sunset when the sky transitions from a warm, golden hue to a deep, saturated blue. Or shoot in the period before sunrise when the dark sky turns blue before full illumination from the sun.

December

Upside Down. Find or create a scene where the main subject or key parts of the image are upside down. Don't take a photo and flip it when editing.

January

Mystery Topic. We will draw a topic out of a hat at the December exhibition. There will be six topics in the hat, all of which will be fairly easy to complete. You must submit a new image taken before the January due date. No taking images from your archives!

February

Something Old. No pictures of other club members. :)

March

Get Low. Lie prone to get your shot or shoot from a very low angle.

April

Leading Lines. Use lines within an image to guide a viewer's eye to the main subject or focal point. These lines can be natural, like rivers or roads, or human-made, such as fences or buildings. By strategically placing leading lines, photographers can create a sense of depth, movement and visual interest in their images.

May

Crooked. Twisted, bent or uneven. Not straight. (We are not looking for curves.)
